Course Description and Goals:

Advanced Placement United States History is a college-level course providing analysis and evaluation of American historical concepts and themes. Historical issues will be studied and interpreted through primary and secondary sources. Students must actively participate in class discussions, effectively complete critical writing exercises and essays, and practice historical thinking skills through research and analysis. Consistent effort will prepare students to achieve high scores on the AP exam and may earn university/college credit.

Course Themes/Thematic Learning Objectives

American and National Identity (NAT) Migration and Settlement (MIG) America in the World (WOR) Culture and Society (CUL) Work, Exchange, and Technology (WXT) Politics and Power (POL) Geography and Environment (GEO)

-Chronological Reasoning (Historical Causation, Patterns of Continuity & Change Over Time, Periodization) - Comparison and Contextualization

The Exam

THE AP EXAM will be May 10th, 2019 at 8 AM. Put this on your calendar & on your parents' calendar! No trips, doctors appointments etc.

The College Board redesigned the APUSH Exam during the 2014-2015 school year and has made several small changes since. Students will need to have an in-depth content knowledge beginning with the early colonial period and continuing up through recent times. Students will also have to be able to express this knowledge in written form. Students will be expected to analyze primary documents and write extensive essays throughout this course.

AP U.S. HISTORY EXAM: 3 HOURS 15 MINUTES

The AP Exam questions measure students' knowledge of U.S. history and their ability to think historically. Questions are based on key and supporting concepts, course themes, and historical thinking skills.

Format of Assessment

Section I Part A: Multiple Choice | 55 Questions | 55 Minutes | 40% of Exam Score

• Questions appear in sets of 2–5.

• Students analyze historical texts, interpretations, and evidence.

• Primary and secondary sources, images, graphs, and maps are included.

Section I Part B: Short Answer | 4 Questions | 45 Minutes | 20% of Exam Score

• Questions provide opportunities for students to demonstrate what they know best. (No thesis.)

• Some questions include texts, images, graphs, or maps.

Section II Part A: Document Based | 1 Question | 60 Minutes | 25% of Exam Score

• Analyze and synthesize historical data. (Thesis required.)

• Assess written, quantitative, or visual materials as historical evidence.

Section II Part B: Long Essay | 1 Question | 35 Minutes | 15% of Exam Score

• Students select one question among two.

• Explain and analyze significant issues in U.S. history. (Thesis required.)

• Develop an argument supported by an analysis of historical evidence.

About the Course

<u>Unit Syllabus</u>: Each unit will begin with a syllabus that will list the key terms and themes for the unit, reading schedule, as well as, a tentative date for the unit test. This will be your "homework," along with any other projects / activities.

GRADING PROCEDURES:			

Grades will be calculated on a point system. Grades are accessible through Duval County FOCUS System. All work must be handwritten in ink. The individual grades students receive will be decided upon by the teacher. Each assignment will be assigned a certain amount of points based on the difficulty of the assignment. The following are examples of some of the assignments that will be completed and the percentage of the grade each category will be:

Reading Quizzes: Students will have a weekly/daily reading quiz. These may or may not be announced and will be based from previous lessons, readings, and homework. Quizzes may range in points.

Formal Unit Tests: These will be in the AP Format with multiple choice questions, Short Answers, Long Essays, and a Document Based Question. These will be worth 50-100 points.

Notebook Checks: These will be worth 50-100 points. These are an essential component of the course and are the students' responsibility to keep up with pages.

Writing/Projects: There will be many written assignments as well as individual and group projects done either during class or outside of class. These assignments may range in points.

•TARDIES – All students are expected to be in class and in their seats when the bell rings. Tardy must be in hand if student is tardy.

• ATTENDANCE AND MAKE-UP WORK –Attendance in class is extremely important! When a student is absent they will be asked to supply an excuse note. If there is question, the parent will be contacted, so a parent note would be helpful. If it seems that the student was skipping the work cannot be made up. It is up to the student to get the make-up work from the day they were absent. Since this is an AP course we will be covering a chapter a day, so any days missed will require a pretty heavy make-up load, because you'll have the work from the day missed and the current day. If you know prior to missing a day please ask if you may get the work in advance, but this will only be for certain circumstances. I may be able to give you an idea of the work, but will most likely have work to be made up when student returns.

In the event the student misses a TEST, they will have 2 days from the day the student returns to make up. If the test is not made up then it will result in a zero. They may take tests early too.

• ID BADGES AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES – Students will be checked for I.D. badges as they enter the classroom. Please remember students must wear their I.D. badges at all times. Students are not permitted to use any electronic devices (cell phones, mp3 players, I-Pods, etc) during class unless allowed by the teacher for certain tasks. Electronic devices will be confiscated.

• INTERNET ACCESS – Students will have assigned work that requires typing, or use of the internet. For students that might not have access to computers at home, there are computers available at school. Classroom computers are available before and after school. I will also use the system REMIND which students and parents can download

• LATE WORK – Late work will **NOT** be accepted. If you have a serious situation come up you are allowed a "one time" next day submission. I must receive an email or Remind message prior to midnight of the day the assignment is due. The assignment will be only half credit once graded.
